## Code of Practice relating to the Oxford University Students' Union

- Section 22(3) of the Education Act 1994 (the 'Act') requires Council, as the executive governing body of the University of Oxford (the 'University'), to publish a code of practice specifying how certain requirements of the Act which relate to the Oxford University Students' Union ('Oxford SU') are carried into effect and providing details of arrangements made to secure their observance.
- The Act includes a general duty for Council to take steps to secure that Oxford SU operates in a fair and democratic manner and is accountable for its finances. This duty is set out in <u>Statute</u> <u>XIII, Part A</u> and monitored by Council through its Education Committee's Joint Subcommittee with Student Members ('JSCECSM'), as specified in Part 33.4 of <u>Council Regulation 15 of</u> <u>2002</u>.
- 3. Section 22(2) of the Act requires steps to be taken to secure the observance of various specific requirements. The following table sets out each requirement, together with details of their implementation by the University, and, where appropriate, shows how JSCECSM is tasked with monitoring the fulfilment of those requirements on behalf of Council:
